Common Drought-Tolerant Plants...

- Pimpernel
- Geranium
- Marigold
- Petunia
- Dusty Miller
- Verbena
- Indigo
- Daylily
- Poppy

Trees and Shrubs...

- Box Elder
- Black Locust
- Sassafras
- Flowering Quince
- Gray Dogwood
- Witch Hazel
- Juniper
- Bayberry

Keep the area clear of weeds.

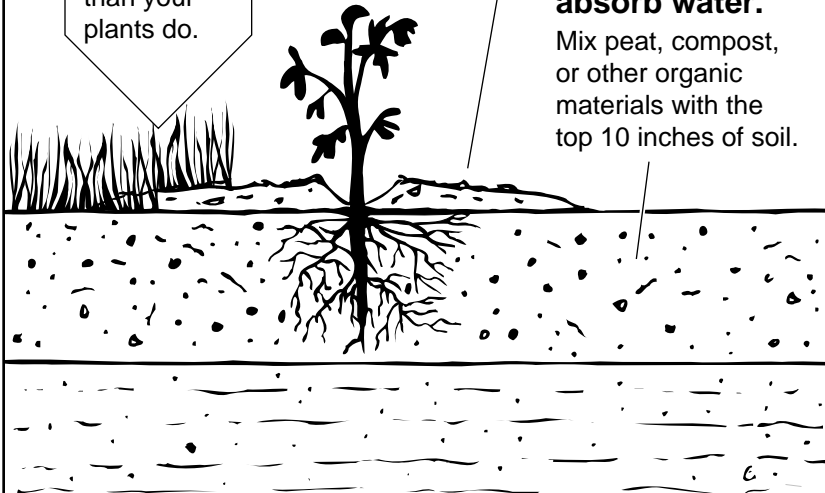
Weeds may consume more water than your plants do.

Apply mulch 3 to 4 inches deep.

Mulch controls weeds and helps your plants and soil retain water.

Help your soil absorb water.

Mix peat, compost, or other organic materials with the top 10 inches of soil.
