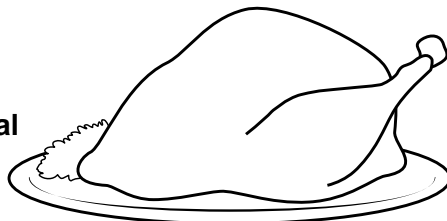
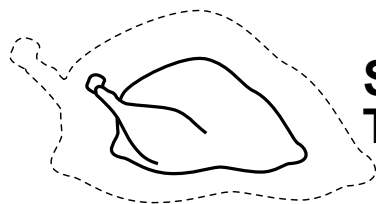


Today's smaller families often don't have large, traditional holiday meals.



Here are a few alternatives to cooking large, whole turkeys...

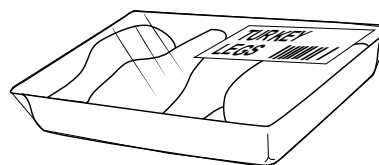


### **Smaller Turkeys**
